For History Day, we wanted to do our project on someone local, but also someone with lots of information about him. At first we wanted to do our project on the founder of our home town, Poulsbo, though we soon learned that we could find absolutely nothing about him. Then we thought about something larger, the city of Seattle. Then we wondered about Chief Seattle since we used to go to school in the community where he was buried. We figured that since the city of Seattle was named after him, he must have had a pretty big impact.
