

quote = verb
quotation = noun



All entries end in a period!
Just double-space—don't skip extra lines.

Keep your tenses consistent.
Avoid passive voice.
No slang. No contractions. No abbreviations.
No first or second person in the annotations.

→ Citations are *reverse-indented*.

Double titles use a colon and a capital.

Use the LAST name of the person unless you are talking about his or her childhood.

Tell the unique information this resource gave, not how you felt about it.

Double-space.
TNR 12.
One-inch margins.
Spell check.
Be consistent: for example, US or U.S. or United States.

Don't include dictionaries, encyclopedias, or sites for posting kids' work—including about.com., Wikipedia, ThinkQuest.
